#### Free Household Hazardous Waste Roundup

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Works and Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County are hosting a free household hazardous waste roundup in La Mirada on Saturday, May 2 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Residents may safely dispose of household hazardous waste items at La Mirada Regional Park in the Tennis Court Parking Lot, off of Adelfa Drive. The event is open to all Los Angeles County residents, and proof of residency is required.

Materials such as motor oil, paint, turpentine, cleaners which contain acids or lye, household and car batteries, Electronic waste, Universal Waste, pesticides and garden herbicides can all be brought to the Countywide Hazardous Waste Roundup.

#### Free Paper Shredding Event, Electronic Waste Collection and Mulch Distribution

Protect the security of your confidential information by shredding your personal documents. The City and EDCO Disposal are sponsoring a free shredding event on Saturday, May 2 from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. at the La Mirada Community Gymnasium. All items will be shredded on site. Limit three bankers boxes (10"x12"x15") per household.

Unwanted electronics (e-waste) will also be collected including TVs, computer monitors, printers, fax machines, VCRs, DVD players, and answering machines. No household hazardous waste (HHW) material will be accepted.

Free mulch will also be available while supplies last. This is a selfserve, self-loading service, and residents must bring their own cans, bags and shovel. Limit of 3 cans/bags per vehicle. Remember to bring a tarp to cover your material. This event is for La Mirada residents only.

The La Mirada Community Gymnasium is located at 15105 Alicante Road and residents are asked to enter off of Alicante Road.

#### **Measure I Update**

The first phase of the Measure I funded projects included residential areas north of Imperial Highway. The project is anticipated to be completed this month. The funds are used for improvements including street pavement, sidewalk, curb and gutter rehabilitation, installation of new or updated handicap curb access ramps to conform to current access codes, and removal and replacement of all slotted cross gutters. Work also includes relining or replacement of deteriorated corrugated metal storm drain pipe.

According to a mid-year review of the budget, Measure I revenues were \$2.2 million and are projected to be \$4.6 million by the end of the year.

"We are looking forward to the completion of the first phase of Measure I and the beginning stages of Phase 2," says Public Works Director/City Engineer Mark Stowell. "Measure I will provide much needed neighborhood roadway improvements throughout the City."

Phase 2 of the Measure I funded work includes residential neighborhoods bounded by Alondra Boulevard, Stage Road, Biola Avenue, Rosecrans Avenue, La Mirada Boulevard, Ocaso Avenue, Barnwall Street and Dalmatian Avenue. Construction is scheduled to begin in early summer.

#### La Mirada Streetlight Poles Replacement in Progress

Southern California Edison (SCE) is currently installing over 1,800 concrete streetlight poles throughout La Mirada. This is in an effort to upgrade the aging steel poles in the community which, on average, are over 50 years old.

The project is a result of a mandate from the State Public Utilities Commission and SCE is investing over \$7 million in the project.

It was a high priority to make sure the new streetlight poles could withstand different weather conditions such as high winds, heat and rain. The new lightpoles are more aesthetically pleasing, and City crews are using this opportunity to update signage attached to the poles.

Contractors are removing the existing steel poles and installing new concrete poles. In some cases, the poles must be replaced in the exact same location, resulting in a temporary interruption of service. SCE has attempted to keep interruptions to a minimum.

SCE is approximately 80 percent complete with the work. The entire project is expected to be completed in May.

#### **Foster Park Update**

The fourth and final phase of Foster Park Neighborhood street improvements is scheduled to be complete by May. The final phase includes the area south of Milan Creek between Marquardt Avenue and Valley View Avenue. This project marks the completion of the Foster Park neighborhood-wide infrastructure improvement effort that began in 2010. The Foster Park work includes the entire residential area within La Mirada west of Valley View Avenue.

Since the inception of the project, the City has added over 100 streetlights, planted more than 600 parkway trees, repaved or reconstructed all streets and replaced damaged sidewalk, curb and gutter. Streets were reconstructed and re-graded with storm drains added to alleviate potential street flooding. Funding for the work was provided by Redevelopment Bond proceeds and Community Development Block Grant funds.

#### La Mirada Symphony Concert



#### Massage Establishment Ordinance in La Mirada

In October 2011, the State of California enacted a law that eliminated the City's ability to regulate massage establishments. It also created a new regulatory entity, the California Massage Therapy Council (CAMTC), which was given tremendous oversight authority over these businesses. Since the creation of CAMTC, many cities, including La Mirada have experienced a significant increase in the number of massage establishments in their communities. The number of massage establishments in La Mirada increased from one in 2011 to eight currently operating.

"Instead of professionalizing massage therapists, the legislation unfortunately created a way for massage establishments to proliferate because cities were effectively prevented from regulating them." says Senior Administrative Analyst Mark Rounds.

In response to local government leaders calling on the State Legislature to repeal the 2011 law, the State enacted Assembly Bill 1147, which restored some of the land use powers previously used in regulating massage establishments. The bill became effective January 1, 2015.

The new changes must be made in the form of municipal code amendments, which require additional time for consideration. As a result, the City Council recently approved a temporary moratorium on the establishment of any new massage business until the necessary code amendments can be made. The temporary moratorium will expire in early 2016. By then, a permanent ordinance will be in place.

#### 2015 Lawnmower Exchange Program Registration Begins on Earth Day

Registration for "Mow Down Air Pollution 2015," South Coast Air Quality Management District's (SCAQMD) Lawnmower Exchange Program is underway.

Six models will be available at exchange events scheduled throughout the four-county South Coast Air Basin. Residents living within SCAQMD's jurisdiction may register to turn in a working gas-powered lawn mower and purchase a new cordless rechargeable electric zero-emission mower at a greatly reduced price, ranging from \$100 to \$250. Since 2003, over 53,000 gasoline-powered lawn mowers have been traded in.

SCAQMD will have a total of 4,000 mowers to exchange this year. The exchange program will be held in the following cities:

- May 9 Long Beach
- May 23 Anaheim
- May 30 Riverside
- June 13 Ontario
- June 20 Arcadia

#### Beware of Telephone Scams

Many people each year fall victim to fraud. Criminals who use the telephone as a means to commit their illegal activity will stop at nothing to steal your money.

Common schemes used in telephone scams involve the victims thinking they are in jeopardy of being arrested for a debt or have won a prize. The following is a list of telephone scams that have recently been reported by La Mirada residents.

• IRS or U.S. Treasury Scams: Victims are told they owe the Internal Revenue Service or United States Treasury Department money and will be arrested if they do not pay immediately. The caller instructs the victim to wire money to an account or provide the code to a wire transfer card as payment.

"Government agencies will always mail formal documents on official letterhead when contacting people for serious matters like outstanding debt," advises La Mirada's Safety Education Officer Mary Cipres. "If you are unsure if it's a scam, an official phone number will almost certainly be provided in the letter to confirm its authenticity."

- Foreign Lotteries and Sweepstakes Scams: Victims receive calls, mail, or emails indicating they won a lottery or sweepstakes in a foreign drawing. In order to collect the winnings, the victim must first pay various taxes and fees. If you are truly a winner of a sweepstakes, you will never be asked to pay money upfront.
- Money Transfer Scams: Victims are asked to help illegally transfer funds out of another country in return for a share of the money. Victims then provide their bank account information or pay money up front to complete the transaction.
- Charity Scams: Victims are asked for donations to non-existent or fraudulent charities to pay for funeral expenses of a murdered loved one. Beware of charities that solicit over the telephone. You should always research charities through the Better Business Bureau at (909) 825-7280 before donating.
- Relative in Distress Scams: Victims are contacted by someone claiming to be a relative of the victim in distress. The scammer advises the victim of the circumstances of their situation and asks for help in the form of cash.

If you have been a victim of telemarketing fraud, you're likely to be contacted again by somebody promising to get your money back. This is also a scam.

Register for the National Do Not Call Registry at (888) 382-1222. It is free and will help to prevent telemarketing calls. If you feel you have been the victim of fraud, contact the La Mirada Community Sheriff's Station at (562) 902-2960.



#### **Crimes of Opportunity**

Last year, the City of La Mirada enjoyed the lowest Part I crime rate in nearly 30 years. Part I crimes include major crimes such as homicide, larceny, burglaries, and auto thefts. Proactive enforcement by the La Mirada Public Safety Team coupled with residents taking steps to prevent property crime contributed to the low crime rate.

In the first quarter of 2015, residential and vehicle burglaries combined for nearly one-third of the 189 property crimes reported in La Mirada. Of the 205 Part I crimes reported from January to March, 92 percent were crimes involving stolen property.

"Property crimes are considered crimes of opportunity and in many cases can be easily prevented," explains Crime Scene Technician Jennifer Anderson. "Residents can prevent becoming another statistic by limiting the opportunity for criminals to commit property crimes."

In most vehicle burglary incidents, the common mistake victims make is leaving valuables including wallets, purses, gym bags, electronics, GPS devices, and identification in plain view. Always remember to take valuables with you or store them in the trunk, and lock your doors anytime you leave your vehicle unattended. Window-smash burglaries take only seconds to occur and are rarely observed.

The most common method of entry for residential burglaries is through a rear window or unlocked doors. Keep all windows closed in your home, even in the warm summer months, and ensure home alarm systems are monitored by the alarm company. Residents are also encouraged to sign up for Vacation Security Checks when leaving on vacation.
